A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of the Sixteenth Sunday after Trinity September 19th—September 25th



Catechesis Notes for the Week: We set off on a year-long journey through the Bible and the Catechism. Together we will learn, pray, and grow in the basics of the Bible on which our faith is founded. We begin with the First and Second Commandments.

The First Commandment teaches us that there is only one God: the Holy Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We are to trust in Him above all things. We are to love Him and cling to Him. In the First Commandment, we find that the root of all sin is failing to fear, love, and trust in God above all things. We trust in worldly things for our survival and happiness. We forget that God is the source of all things. In this Commandment, God calls us to repentance—to confess our sin and trust in the love of Christ. He was obedient to the Father, even to the point of death. We run to Christ for forgiveness.

The Second Commandment teaches us to pray to God at all times and for all things. Is there trouble? Then we pray—not just that God would take the trouble away, but to teach us to trust even when the way is hard. We pray that God would give us the wisdom and ability to receive our daily crosses rejoicing and giving thanks. This Commandment shows us how hard it is for us to remain faithful in the midst of troubles and to pray this way. Instead of praying for God's will to be done, we insist that God should do what we want. Instead of praising Him in the midst of suffering, we curse Him in unbelief. This commandment calls us to repentance, and to see Christ, who prayed for us, even as He sweat drops of blood in the shadow of the cross. Yet, He did not turn from the suffering, but accepted the Father's will so that we might be saved. Because Jesus was obedient even to death, the Father hears our prayers. Therefore, in good times and bad, we can call on His name, pray, praise, and give thanks. And we do all this trusting He we give us just what we need.

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

This Week's Theme: Salvation comes only from the Triune God

Verse: Deuteronomy 6:4-5

Prayer on the Psalm: O God, thanks and praise belong to You because You have given us Your Holy Word. Bestow Your blessing and prosperity on the works of our hands in our Christian calling and all our conversation. Amen.

What does this mean?


We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things.

Daily Themes for Prayer

Whoever Humbles Himself Will Be Exalted

"Do not put yourself forward in the king's presence" (Prov. 25:6–14). Rather, take the lowest position at the table. Humble yourself before Him. For your place is not for you to take but for Him to give. Conduct yourself with all lowliness and gentleness, bearing with one another in love (Eph. 4:1–6), that the King may give you glory in the presence of those at the table with you. "For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted" (Luke 14:1–11). Is this not the way of Christ? He is the one who took the lowest place, who humbled Himself even to the point of death for us. He is now exalted to the highest place at the right hand of the Father that penitent believers may be exalted together with Him in the resurrection. To the humble at His Supper He says, "Friend, move up higher," giving you His very body and blood for your forgiveness that you may ascend to take part in the great wedding feast which has no end.
